



EZAS RULES AND REGULATIONS

All persons entering the grounds MUST pay the admission fee. There will be no exceptions, everyone is treated alike. This applies to officials of the Fair, employees, exhibitors, performers, concessionaires and fair visitors. The following rules apply. Please read them carefully and if you have any questions, ask any Agricultural Society Director.

1. ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED on Embro & Zorra Agricultural Society entry forms to be eligible for prize money. All entry fees are designated as prize money. EVERY exhibitor must have an exhibitor number. This number may be acquired from the Treasurer of the Fair. This rule applies to youth exhibitors as well as those entering adult classes. The only exceptions to this rule are for those entering the following: Baby Show, Pet Show, Pumpkin Prince & Princess. Anyone entering other classes is required to have an exhibitor number. <u>All prize money will be available for pick up at the Gourmet Spaghetti Dinner or contact the Fair Treasurer to arrange pick-up</u>.

2. When filling out the form: FULL NAME, FULL MAILING ADDRESS, PHONE NUMBER, & EMAIL ADDRESS must be included. On entry tags, please complete with exhibitor name, exhibitor number, class name & number, and section number. <u>FAILURE TO DO SO WILL RESULT IN NON-PAYMENT</u>.

3. Rules regarding entry, deductions, etc. have been determined by Class, rather than by the age of the entrant. It is therefore important to read the rules at the beginning of each class carefully. All entrants in a class will be treated alike regardless of whether an exhibitor is a youth or an adult.

4. Youth/Junior exhibitors must be age 17 and younger as of JUNE 1, 2023. No entry fee is required for youth/junior classes however an exhibitor number must be obtained from the Treasurer. This number must be included with all entries (entry form & entry tag) in all classes. No adults are allowed to enter these classes.

5. If a Youth wishes to enter a class not labelled "Youth/Junior", the regular membership fee of \$5.00 must be paid in order to be eligible to e



RULES A

6. All persons shall be admissible of this Society upon payment of an annual membership fee of \$5.00. Anyone entering classes not labelled Youth (unless otherwise specified) is required to be a member of the Society. Anyone who enters classes requiring the payment of a membership fee who earns \$5.00 or more in net prize money, shall have their 2023 membership fee retained. This rule applies to Youth who enter adult classes, as well as adults. Memberships must be purchased from the Fair Treasurer at the Fair before any entries are placed.

7. In lieu of entry fees, 15% will be deducted from all prize money \$5.00 and over. This applies to all livestock classes other than Junior livestock and 4-H classes. <u>ALL PRIZE</u> <u>MONEY will be available for pick up at the Gourmet Spaghetti Dinner or contact the Fair</u> <u>Treasurer to arrange pickup</u>. If after all deductions (including membership & entry fees) total prize money owing to any person, excluding Youth, is less than \$2.00, a cheque will not be issued. Cheques are issued on a one per family basis.

8. All exhibits must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor unless otherwise stated. Anyone exhibiting or permitting any person to exhibit his/her name on any livestock or articles which are not bonafide property shall forfeit all prizes that may be awarded to them in the exhibition.

9. Judges shall have discretionary powers in withholding prizes. No person can judge their own property.

10. No person shall be allowed to enter more than one specimen in any section of a class. This rule does not apply to livestock.

11. All articles & displays to be judged must be in place by 8:00 p.m., Friday, September 15, 2023. Judging & placing to be completed Saturday morning. All entries must remain until 4:00 p.m. Sunday, September 17, 2023. This rule will be strictly enforced and if violated, will cause forfeiture of

prizes.



EZAS RULES AND REGUI ATIONS

12. All livestock entries to be made by 10:00 a.m. on the day of show.

13. The Society will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of animals and articles sent to the exhibition. It is understood, however, that the owners assume the risk of exhibiting any animal or article. Should any animal or article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Society will give all assistance in their power to aid in the recovery of the same, however, the Society will not make any payment for the value of the item lost, injured or stolen.

14. Judges will distinguish animals & articles to which prizes are awarded by attaching prize stickers/ribbons to them.

15. No article shall be exhibited which has been awarded a prize at a previous Embro Fair unless in a collection of fancy work.

16. Any person driving faster than a walk outside the horse ring shall be held responsible for any damage that may be incurred by doing so and will be removed from the grounds.
17. All commercial vendors for the Artisan Market – outside frontage display is 10 feet.
Artisan vendors are to pay a \$20 vendor fee and admission to the fair. All Food Booths will be charged \$100, paid in advance to the Treasurer. Please book in advance and reserve your spot with the chairperson of the Artisan Market. No commercial booths will be allowed on the premises without the written permission of the Board of Directors.

18. In case of bad weather, or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying expenses and all prizes in full after paying expenses, a proportionate amount, exclusive of membership, will be deducted from prizes to enable the directors to balance the accounts without loss. The Directors feel that this course is the most equitable that can be adopted and will allow deductions to fall proportionately on all those participating and will not leave the whole sum to be a debt to bear heavily on the Society and thereby impair its usefulness.
19. All cheques issued by the Society MUST BE CASHED WITHIN 60 DAYS. This rule will be strictly



20. If an error or omission occurs in the prize list, the Directors have the power to correct the same.

21. The Directors reserve the right in all cases to interpret their own rules.

22. ALL LIVESTOCK OWNERS must show proof of Liability Insurance at time of registration. Food Vendors must also show proof of Liability Insurance upon entry of the grounds.

23. This Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the fairgrounds during the Fair. While the Officers and Directors of the Society will use every available means to prevent accidents in and about the grounds, it must be strictly understood that all persons going into or upon the show grounds must personally assume all risk of accidents or injury from accidents or from any cause whatsoever. Any information collected by the Embro & Zorra Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other person related directly to the business of the Embro & Zorra Agricultural Society and the Embro Fair, will be solely used for the purposes of promotion of the Society and Fair and for the maintenance of their files and database. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Embro & Zorra Agricultural Society and Embro Fair, their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be soled or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

Any male or female from the area is eligible to enter, as long as he or she meets the criteria outlined in rules 3 & 4. A contestant must be sponsored by a local business or an organization. A HOMECRAFT COMMITTEE UPDATE

In the past, the Homecraft Committee has been a branch of the EZAS. As of 2022, the Homecraft Division has officially merged with the EZAS Main Board. This has allowed more opportunities for engagement throughout the entire Society. EZAS believes in an inclusive environment, for all. The Main Board is very excited to welcome the Homecraft Committee to our monthly meetings.

The Homecraft Committee is responsible for many of the exhibition entries and judging at the fair. You will find many of these items located inside the main entrance of the Embro Zorra Community Centre, on the north half of the arena floor.

Prior to the fair, Homecraft members:

- Set the sections in each class and ensure the prizebook entries are correct. Classes reflect the fair theme, and are changed slightly each year.

- Contact a judge from the OAAS accredited judging list to judge their class
- Arrange a judges luncheon and meal for set-up crew
- Contact the EZAS Secretary regarding ribbons, rosettes etc.
- Help to set up the exhibit tables, paper, skirting, signage, decor, and netting
- Are present when entries arrive and ensure the entry tags are labeled correctly
- Are available when judging occurs to assist the judge as needed
- Display the items after they have been judged and attach prize stickers
- Ensure EZAS Treasurer has a record of the prize winners in order to distribute prize money to each exhibitor

After the fair, Homecraft members will return entries to the appropriate section tables. Homecraft members will also be responsible for take-down of the exhibit displays and clean-up of the exhibit hall.



Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of two clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 mL).

Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.

Any honey entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.

An approved colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.

Honey will be judged using the standards printed in the OAAS Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs.

It is a condition of entry that all honey products entered become property of the OAAS. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention.

OAAS HAND QUILTING CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION

GENERAL RULES:

Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Society (OAAS) fair to be eligible for the competition. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition). The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS. Judging will occur at local fair and District levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention. Upon making an entry into the OAAS Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition. The winning OAAS Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS competitions.

Local Fair Competition:

Local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (minimum 324" measured on the perimeter) judged the Best of Show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition OR if any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Show at more than one fair, the other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter the Reserve Champion quilt in the District Competition. An exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different fairs, shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at District Competition. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible quilts as well as Reserve of all eligible quilts. The Grand Champion & Reserve are judged from all first and second place eligible quilts.



OAAS HAND QUILTING CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION

District Competitions: Judging quilts at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District. The first place hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Meeting. In cases where the winner of the District Quilt decides not to enter the OAAS Competition, the second place quilt will be eligible. The OAAS will award a ribbon and the district will award prize money of 1st \$25.00; 2nd - \$15.00; 3rd - \$10.00.

All District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form, returned to the OAAS. c/o Kathryn Lambert, by December 1st for payment of prize money. (NOTE: Late entry forms may disqualify the District Quilt entry from competition)

OAAS MACHINE QUILTING CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION

GENERAL RULES:

Quilt must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor on a long arm machine and exhibited and judged at a local OAAS fair to be eligible for this competition.

Quilt to be measured on the perimeter (minimum 324"). NOTE: quilt can be square, rectangular, etc.

Judging will occur at local fairs and then at District levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.

Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine-Quilting Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

The winning OAAS Machine-Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competitions.

The winner's name will be displayed at the fair on a sign provided by OAAS. Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

Local Fair Competitions:

Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt, judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted quilts to the District Competition OR if any entry wins Best of Show at more than one fair, the other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Machine-Quilted Quilt in the District Competition. An exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show with a different machine-quilted quilt at different fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District competition.

Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible quilts as well as a Reserve. The Grand Champion & Reserve are judged from all first and second prize eligible quilts.



OAAS MACHINE QUILTING CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION

District Competitions:

Judging at the District level will be the responsibility of each OAAS District. The first-place winning machine-quilted quilt from the District is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first place quilt decides not to enter the OAAS Competition, the second-prize quilt at District level will be eligible. The OAAS will award a ribbon and the District will award prize money of 1st - \$25.00; 2nd - \$15.00; 3rd - \$10.00. All District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Machine-Quilting

All District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Machine-Quilting Entry Form, returned to the OAAS Secretary by December 1st. (NOTE: late entry forms may disqualify the District Quilt entry from competition).
